Thanks to Alec Templeton for the guitar chords ('borrowed' from his piece 'Bach Goes to Town')





My wife, June, and I had the first waltz to this tune on


Sunday 20th January 2013.

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## Number 5 Bell Hornpipe


I had the idea of using the Westminster chimes as a fugue subject but also had of the sound of a hornpipe in my head, and so decided to combine the two. The rather clangy bell section in the middle is deliberate as bells are often a little discordant, but it also gives the opportunity for the bell like quality of the mandolin to be used to good effect.
